The Bishop John Bryson Chane Scholarship for Social Justice

The Bishop John Bryson Chane Scholarship for Social Justice was established by the Episcopal Church Women's Board to recognize graduating high school seniors in the Diocese of Washington who have shown an interest in **social justice issues**.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

To be considered for this scholarship, you must:

- 1. Be a graduating high school senior in the Diocese of Washington.
- 2. Be an active member of an Episcopal church in the Diocese of Washington.
- 3. Be accepted for full time enrollment to attend an accredited junior or community college or an accredited four-year college or university.
- 4. Have a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher.

SELECTION PROCESS

The Scholarship Committee will consider these criteria in making their selection:

- 1. Academic achievement
- 2. Letters of recommendation from Rector and school administrator or counselor (sealed envelope.)
- 3. A statement of educational goals and career objectives (not to exceed 300 words).
- 4. A brief essay of 250 words on one social justice issue that is important to you.

DEADLINE TO APPLY

Applications must be received or postmarked by **May 31**st. Applications received after the deadline will not be considered.

NOTIFICATION

Awardees will be notified by June 30th. Award letters will be mailed by July 7th.

NUMBER OF AWARDS

One scholarship will be awarded for each of the regions of the Diocese of Washington.

AMOUNT OF AWARDS

Will vary, based on the availability of funds.

METHOD OF DISBURSEMENT

Awards are paid in one installment and mailed directly to each college or university.
